L E A S E

THIS INDENTURE OF LEASE (hereinafter called "Lease") is made on or as of the 2nd day of March, 1987, by and between the VILLAGE OF PITTSFORD, New York (hereinafter called "Village"), a municipal corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York, having its principal office at 21 Main Street North in the Village of Pittsford, County of Monroe, and State of New York 14534, and THE RAYSON-MILLER POST #899, AMERICAN LEGION, and its auxiliary, not-for-profit organizations chartered by the National American Legion and serving war veterans and their dependents in the Pittsford, New York area (hereinafter called "Tenant").

W I T N E S S E T H :

1. Premises

That in consideration of the covenants, agreements, and stipulations herein contained on the part of said Tenant to be paid, kept and faithfully performed by said Tenant, the Village does hereby lease, demise and let unto said Tenant, a certain portion of the premises known as the Village Hall (as shown on Exhibit "A" attached hereto), located at 21 Main Street North, in the Village of Pittsford, County of Monroe, State of New York.

2. Term

Tenant agrees to accept the premises in an "as is" condition. Said Tenant to have and to hold said premises hereby

leased for a term of one (1) year commencing March 1, 1987 . Said lease term shall end one (1) lease year after such commencement of term. A lease year is defined to be the period of twelve (12) consecutive calendar months, beginning with the first (1st) day of the first (1st) full month after the Lease commences and ending on the last day of the twelfth (12th) month thereafter. At the end of the term or if lease is sooner terminated, Tenant agrees to surrender the premises broom clean and in the same condition as when just occupied, reasonable and wear and tear excepted.

3. Rate

Tenant covenants to pay to the Village as rent for said premises during the lease term an annual rental in the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) on the first (1st) day of each and every lease year, without demand and without offset. Tenant shall pay to the Village One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) per year toward the expense of utilities. Said sum shall be paid at the commencement of this Lease and annually thereafter if extended. This payment is non-refundable.

4. Maintenance

The Village shall be responsible for major maintenance and repairs to the plumbing, electrical and heating systems in the leased premises. The Tenant shall be responsible for routine cleaning in the demised basement premises. Routine repairs shall be at the expense of the Tenant to preserve the premises in good working order and condition.

5. Signs

No exterior sign shall be erected by the Tenant for identification purposes.

6. Village's Right to Terminate Lease

If at any time during the term of this Lease the Village has an offer to lease the demised premises at terms acceptable to the Village, the Village in such event shall give the Tenant thirty (30) days notice of such proposed lease and the terms thereof. The Tenant shall have the first option to lease the demised premises on those terms for a thirty (30) day period. Should the Tenant not so lease the demised premises on those terms, then Tenant's right shall, in all respects, be terminated and this Lease shall be deemed, in all respects, cancelled.

7. Improvements

The cost of any alteration and/or improvements to the leased premises shall be made at the expense of the Tenant. Any such alterations or improvements shall only be made by the Tenant if approval for same is first obtained by the Village. In the construction of any alterations and/or improvements to the premises, which the Tenant may perform, Tenant agrees to do so in a good and workmanlike manner in accordance with all applicable statutes, laws, rules or regulations having jurisdiction or authority of the premises. Improvements and alterations shall be the property of the Village.

8. Subleasing

The Tenant shall not have the right to sublease the premises.

9. Indemnification

A. The Tenant will indemnify and save the Village harmless from and against any and all liabilities, losses, damages, costs, expenses, causes of action, suits, judgments and claims by or on behalf of any person, firm, corporation or governmental authority for injury or accident to person or property of any nature and howsoever caused, arising in the premises or out of the use, occupation, operation, possession, or control by the Tenant of the premises during the term of this Lease, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, all liabilities, claims and expenses arising from any work, improvement, or thing done in or about the premises by the Tenant, or from any act or omission of the Tenant or any agent, contractor, servant or employee of the Tenant in the course of their employment. The Village covenants that it will give prompt written notice, if any claim is asserted, for which it may seek indemnification hereunder for acts of the Tenant or its agents, employees or invitees.

B. The Village will indemnify and save the Tenant harmless from and against any and all liabilities, losses, damages, costs, expenses, causes of action, suits, judgments and claims by or on behalf of any person, firm, corporation or governmental authority for injury or accident to person or property of any nature and howsoever caused, arising in the premises or out of the use, occupation, operation, possession or control by the Village of the premises during the term of this Lease, including, without limiting the generality of the

foregoing, all liabilities, claims and expenses arising from any work, improvement, or thing done in or about the premises by the Village or any agent, contractor, servant or employee of the Village in the course of their employment. The Tenant covenants that it will give prompt written notice, if any claim is asserted, for which it may seek indemnification hereunder for acts of the Village or its agents, servants or invitees.

10. Insurance

During the term of this Lease, the Tenant shall keep the premises insured with bodily injury and property damage liability insurance with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 with respect to any one occurrence. The Village shall be named an additional insured on said insurance policy. A certificate of such insurance evidencing the coverage provided in the policy shall be delivered to the Village. All insurance shall be placed with financially sound and reputable insurers and the certificate shall contain a ten (10) day cancellation clause requiring the insurers, ten (10) days prior to cancellation to notify the Village of Pittsford of said cancellation.

11. Conformity with Laws and Regulations

The Tenant, in the use, occupation, operation, possession, and control of the premises shall comply with all requirements of all laws, orders, ordinances, rules and regulations of the Federal, State and Municipal authorities, with any direction or Certificate of Occupancy, pursuant to law, of any public officer which shall impose any duty on the Tenant with respect to the premises and with any requirements of the Board of

Fire Underwriters with respect to said premises, and the Tenant agrees not to make or suffer any improper or offensive use of the premises or any part thereof. The Tenant agrees not to store any ammunition, whether live or blank, on the subject premises.

12. Default

If at any time during the terms of this Lease the Tenant shall be in default in the performance of any of the covenants, terms, conditions or provisions of this Lease, and the Tenant shall fail to remedy such default, or take reasonable measures to remedy such default, within thirty (30) days after written notice thereof from the Village, then this Lease, at the option of the Village, may be terminated and the Village may, at its option, enter upon the property and again have, repossess and enjoy the premises as if this Lease has not been made.

13. Occupancy after Casualty

If the premises are rendered untenable by fire or other cause or if the premises or the building in which they are located should be damaged or destroyed by fire or other casualty, whether the premises itself be damaged or not, then in such event the Village may, at its option, terminate this Lease or elect to repair or rebuild the same. The Village shall notify the Tenant as to eviction or of its intent to rebuild within thirty (30) days after the casualty in question. If the Village or Tenant elects to terminate this Lease, then the same shall terminate three (3) days after notice is given to either the Tenant and the Village and the Tenant shall immediately vacate the premises and surrender the same to the Village.

14. Inspection and Hours of Access

The Village or its employees or agent shall have the right to enter the property during regular business hours to inspect and examine the demised premises. The Tenant shall have the right to enter the demised premises at all hours during the year. The Village shall provide appropriate lock keys and hardware to permit access by the Tenant. Such equipment shall permit the demised premises (with the exception of common areas and waiting room marked as "A" on Diagram to Exhibit "A") to be locked by Tenant.

15. Surrender of Premises

On the last day or sooner termination of the lease term, Tenant shall quit and surrender the premises, broom clean, in good condition and repair (reasonable wear and tear, and damage by fire excepted), together with all alterations, additions and improvements that may have been made in, to, or on the premises, except movable furniture or movable trade fixtures put in at Tenant's expense.

16. Completeness of Agreement

This Lease sets forth all of the promises, agreements, conditions, and understandings between the Village and Tenant relative to the leased premises.

17. Agreement Binding Upon Successors

The covenants and agreements herein contained shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Village and Tenant and except as otherwise provided herein, their respective successors and assigns.

18. Covenant of Quiet Enjoyment

So long as the Tenant performs all the covenants herein on its part to be performed, the Tenant shall quietly enjoy the premises. The Tenant agrees that a Village approved group or organization may use the demised premises from time to time, but not so as to interrupt or conflict with Tenant's use hereunder.

19. Failure to Enforce

No failure on the part of any party to enforce any covenant, condition or provision herein contained, nor any waiver of any right thereunder by any party, unless in writing, shall discharge or invalidate such covenant, condition or provision or affect the right of any party to enforce the same in the event of any subsequent default.

20. Notice

Any notice required to be given hereunder shall be in writing and shall be sent by Registered or Certified Mail, addressed to the party to whom the same is being given at its address set forth at the beginning of the Lease, or such other address as the party shall have last furnished in writing as being the address to which notices hereunder shall be given.

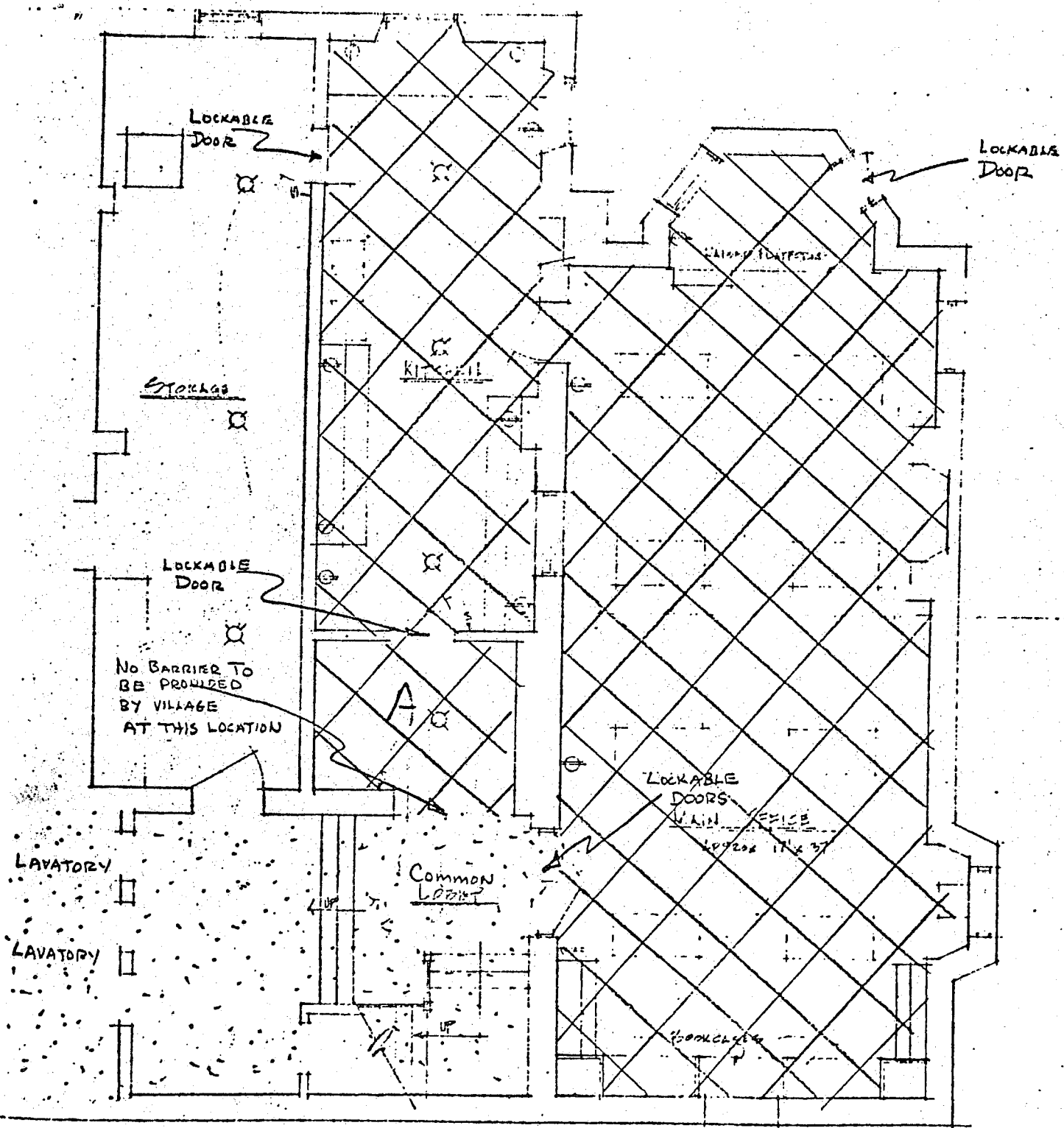

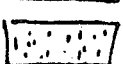

Mayor Plummer asked the Village Clerk to read an overview of the open meeting compliance certification.

MULTI-YEAR FINANCIAL AND CAPITAL PLAN

Mayor Plummer thanked Village Clerk Ciccarelli, Superintendent Bleier, and village staff for all their work on the plan.

Trustee Lanphear arrived at the meeting at 4:20 PM.

Trustee Marshall asked Superintendent Bleier to clarify the priorities within the Multi-Year Plan for the DPW. The superintendent explained that many listed projects had bottlenecked after years of deferment. He felt they could no longer be delayed, and his proposed maintenance schedule was based on best practices. Trustee Cove asked what the video inspection of the sewer was. The superintendent said that it was routine. Trustee Marshall asked the board to take it off the Multi-Year Capital Plan and only have it on the yearly budget in Sewer, which is filed under contractual at \$75,000. The other members agreed. Trustee Marshall also wanted each vehicle to be noted in the individual years rather than in the consolidated, along with a reference to what amount would go toward sewer. He then asked Superintendent Bleier his top two priorities for the coming budget year. The superintendent responded that the top two priorities were the DPW bathrooms and the road work at South and Wood Streets. Trustee Marshall asked the board if they agreed. They stated yes.

Trustee Marshall would also like to have aspirational goals related to possible grants pulled out and listed to the side of the Multi-Year Capital Plan as they would require grant writing service fees. Mayor Plummer offered clarification that anything related to the Climate Smart Plan grant program would not require a grant writer and needed to be considered separately in its framework. She also suggested a separate spreadsheet dedicated to the village's Climate Smart Plan. The members agreed.

GENERAL BUDGET REVIEW

The board wanted the bonding for South and Wood Street roadwork added back into the budget. The village clerk reminded the board if that was done, they should be prepared to vote on overriding the tax cap. Trustee Marshall did not want to vote on the override but wanted to see it reflected in the tentative budget as if the board did, or would in the future, vote yes.

Motion by Mayor Plummer and seconded by Trustee Leitgeb to adjourn for 10 minutes for a break.

Vote: Mayor Plummer – yes, Lanphear – yes, Leitgeb – yes, Cove – yes, Marshall – yes. *Motion passed.*

Motion by Mayor Plummer and seconded by Trustee Cove to reopen the meeting.

Vote: Mayor Plummer – yes, Lanphear – yes, Leitgeb – yes, Cove – yes, Marshall – yes. *Motion passed*

GPI PRESENTATION- SOUTH AND WOOD STREET- 6 PM

GPI representative Caitlyn Hemmes stated the scope of the project would include milling, resurfacing, ADA ramp reconstructions for the sidewalks, and isolated gutter and drainage structure repairs. They also conducted an ADA ramp assessment and found approximately ten ramps did not meet compliance requirements and would need to be reconstructed. GPI also did three coring assessments of each street to determine what resurfacing was needed. South Street was holding together well and would only need milling and resurfacing about a 1.5" to 2" down. Wood Street's layers were no longer holding together, and a full-depth reconstruction would have to be done. Trustee Marshall asked Ms. Hemmes if, in her professional opinion, she could determine a time for how long South Street might last with only the suggested work being done. She responded that if the village kept up a good maintenance, milling, and resurfacing schedule, a complete reconstruction could continue to be pushed out further into the future. Ms. Hemmes then provided an existing conditions chart for Wood Street and two different reconstruction options. Option One would cost \$125,000 to \$130,000. Option Two would cost \$155,000. It was stated that the cost difference was in relation to the additional curbing for Option Two. Trustee Marshall asked if curbs have a known effect on traffic calming. Ms. Hemmes confirmed that they are a visual cue that causes motorists to slow down to avoid hitting their tires. Mayor Plummer also pointed out that curbing prevents people from parking on the sidewalks, all of which would increase pedestrian safety. Ms. Hemmes stated that for \$6,500 more, the section of sidewalk that is only four feet wide and consequently not ADA compliant could be expanded without infringing on any private property, being that it is all in a public right of way.

Jesse Hollenbeck, 8 Wood Street, spoke, stating that he liked how the plan would address drainage, and his only concern was to ensure that fire and emergency services could easily get through if the street ended up being narrowed.

Emily Smallwood-Diaz, 81 South Street, asked if there would be any opportunity for traffic calming when the South and Street construction was completed.

Ms. Hemmes stated that there would be no change in curbing or layout, so no. Mayor Plummer offered to circle back and schedule a time to discuss dealing with vehicles using South Street as a cut-through with the residents separate from the resurfacing project.

A resident who lives on South Street did not feel that there was an increased speeding issue on the Street.

Trustee Marshall asked for a cost estimate for the work on South Street. Ms. Hemmes stated that it would be approximately \$ 480,000.

Mayor Plummer set an action item to gather traffic studies previously done on South Street and forward them to Ms. Hemmes so she could determine if additional engineering surveys needed to be conducted to facilitate traffic calming.

Mayor Plummer also wanted to let the public know that in the past, a speed sentry had been placed on South Street that confirmed 85% of the traffic was speeding, going about fifty miles per hour straight away.

Motion by Trustee Marshall and seconded by Trustee Lanphear to adopt Option Two for the Wood Street road construction and to include the additional \$6,500 in cost to expand the four-foot sidewalk.

Vote: Mayor Plummer – yes, Lanphear – yes, Leitgeb – yes, Cove – yes, Marshall – yes. *Motion passed.*

MULTI-YEAR FINANCIAL AND CAPITAL PLAN

Trustee Marshall said he would prefer to increase taxes across the five years of the plan more consistently than having a minimal raising of taxes the first year and a significant increase in subsequent years.

Trustee Leitgeb asked for clarification as to why Superintendent Bleier was asking for both a new vehicle and new office space in the DPW loft. He stated that he did not understand why there would be a need to move employees away from the building while also giving those same employees more office space if staffing was not increased. Superintendent Bleier responded that both areas had been experiencing a major deficit for years. When one of the current vehicles would go down for maintenance, he could not move all employees across the village to reach job sites efficiently. The current DPW office space and loft lack proper OSHA-approved ventilation from diesel/gas fumes and soot, putting himself and other staff at risk. Also, the loft has no temperature control and could reach 100 degrees in the summer and close to freezing in the winter. Trustee Leitgeb then asked how it was possible that upgrading the loft would only cost \$20,000 while the DPW bathroom upgrades were predicted to cost \$250,000. Superintendent Bleier responded that he made an estimate based on the DPW crew and himself doing all the work in the loft area so they would not have to pay the prevailing wage.

GENERAL BUDGET REVIEW

Trustee Marshall wanted to remove the line for the additional vehicle from the budget because he felt the board would not consider the purchase unless the Climate Smart Plan grant covered the vehicle. He then wanted to add \$20,000 for ventilation and climate control of the loft to create suitable office space. Trustee Leitgeb stated that he did not feel comfortable agreeing to that because, in his estimation, the project would cost more if any sub-contracting was involved. Trustee Marshall suggested that if the project was more money, they could defer the work until the following year and move the budgeted \$20,000 to the DPW building reserves for the next year. If the work

could be done for \$20,000, then the money would still be within the budget and available. Superintendent Bleier felt comfortable with that plan. Trustee Leitgeb also wanted the fencing around the DPW to be removed. Mayor Plummer stated that the hope had been to do the fencing in phases and have the DPW crew do some of the work themselves to put up a split-rail fence instead of a chain-link fence so a safety barrier could start to be created until more money can be budgeted for a more substantial fence. Trustee Lanphear wants signage from the arboretum posted with the fencing.

Trustee Leitgeb left the meeting at 1:04 PM.

The board wanted another meeting date set before the deadline for the tentative budget. The village clerk would send out date options to the trustees.

Trustee Lanphear asked if the AV upgrades to the meeting room were set in stone and questioned if they were necessary this budget year. Trustee Cove said she did not want to move forward with the upgrades now. Village Clerk Ciccarelli told the board that the funds for the AV meeting room upgrades were not affecting the budget as they were being paid through ARPA funds. Trustee Cove said she would rather use the ARPA funds for something else as she felt if people wanted to join the meetings, they could do so in person if the audio and video are subpar for online viewing. Mayor Plummer voiced concern, stating that some residents cannot physically attend the meetings in person and that it is important for all residents to have equal accessibility to the live meetings.
